### **COMMON TERMINOLOGY**

#### **UNIVERSITY VS. COLLEGE**

Common misconception is universities are large and colleges are small. Universities come in all sizes!

What's consistent is that universities are made up of smaller divisions called colleges. Colleges offer specific academic programs and contain specialized schools.

For example, UNC's College of Natural and Health Sciences is home to the School of Nursing.

#### UNDERGRADUATE VS. GRADUATE STUDENT

Undergraduate students, or undergrads as they are known, are students attending college and are working on their bachelor's degree. Graduate students have earned their bachelor's degree and are pursuing additional education to earn a master's, doctoral or specialized degree.

#### FIRST-TIME STUDENT VS TRANSFER STUDENT

Students who graduated from high school and are enrolling in college for the first time at the undergraduate level are considered first-time students. Students who are entering UNC with advanced standing (college credits earned before graduating from high school) are also considered first-time students. Any students who have completed any college-level coursework, including technical or vocational courses, after high school graduation are considered transfer students at UNC.

### **4+1 ACCELERATED MASTER'S PROGRAMS**

We offer a range of degree programs including 4+1 programs. They provide students in select programs a pathway to complete their bachelor's and master's degrees in five years, whereas most master's degree take at least an additional two years to complete, after earning a bachelor's degree in four years.

To get a head start and save time and money, you can begin in select graduate programs as an undergraduate student and complete your degrees in just five years. For example, in our 4+1 Multilingual Education: World Language Licensure program, you will earn both a bachelor's and master's degree after just five years. The accelerated program saves you money, traditionally earning a bachelor's and master's degree separately would take approximately six to seven years to complete.

### Overcoming Obstacles, Making a Difference

Shukuru Rushanika, (ShaQ), B.S. '22 was born in the Democratic Republic of Congo. He spent his childhood in a Tanzanian refugee camp, with his mother and siblings. Even when his family moved to the U.S. while he was in high school, he faced more hurdles when his father was involved in a near-fatal car crash, putting him in a coma.

ShaQ turned adversity into a learning opportunity, asking to shadow his father's medical team to glean all he could — his dream to one day become a doctor.

At UNC he enrolled in the Biological Sciences program in the College of Natural and Health Sciences where he studied biomedicine and pre-health. He continued shadowing, this time at UNC's Cancer Rehabilitation Center.

During his four years, ShaQ did lab research into breast cancer and other biomedical issues, including graduate-level studies.

# Forging Connections Among First Generation Students

Don't be afraid to get involved with a bit of everything, like Rosemary Gonzalez, BSN '23 a stellar well-rounded Nursing graduate. Rosemary plunged headfirst into everything from Greek Life to the Honor's Program to the Center for Human Enrichment (CHE), a community providing academic and personal support for students' academic journeys.

Over four years, she became the president of her sorority, a volunteer, a student-worker and a scholarship recipient, cultivating relationships with other first-generation students like herself.

Rosemary uses these experiences to make connections not only for herself, but also for her fellow students. She connected her sorority sisters to the services offered at the Career Readiness Center where she shared service opportunities offered at CHE with first-generation students.



### Building Lasting Relationships with Faculty

Dante Cesare chose UNC for the small class sizes and 1:1 mentorship with faculty. Dante, B.S. '23 Business Administration, became an involved student in college. He transferred from Aims Community College and engaged with the Monfort College of Business's Entrepreneurial Challenge (e-Challenge), an educational business pitch competition that helps participants acquire entrepreneurial skills and grow innovative ideas.

Dante volunteered as the community college director of the e-Challenge and used his connections from Aims to involve more students in the competition. The 1:1 mentorship from his professors, and Dante's ability to get hands-on experience by developing marketing plans for local businesses made him want to connect, engage and give it his all.

### ADMISSIONS GUARANTEE

At UNC we are deeply committed to a students-first approach. With more than 42% of our students identifying as the first in their families to attend college, we understand how stressful the college search process can be. Our First-Year Admissions Guarantee for Colorado residents removes the guesswork from knowing whether UNC is an option for you.

All Colorado students who meet the first-year guarantee requirements are eligible for automatic admission into UNC.

Non-resident and WUE students who meet these requirements can also expect to be a competitive candidate for admission.

### FIRST-YEAR GUARANTEE REQUIREMENTS:

- 3.0 cumulative high school GPA (weighted)
- 4 years of English
- 4 years of math (or 3 years of math with at least a B in Algebra 2)
- 3 years of physical/lab sciences
- 3 years of social sciences
- · Meet high school graduation requirements
- Submit your application for admissions by March 1 of your graduation year

The UNC Tuition Promise demonstrates our commitment to removing financial barriers for students and families to ensure a college education remains affordable.

Through this program, all Colorado high school graduates who meet the eligibility criteria will receive funding to cover 100% of their standard tuition and mandatory student fees.

### TO BE ELIGIBLE, YOU JUST NEED TO:

- Be a Colorado residents or eligible Military or ASSET undergraduate, working toward your first Bachelor's degree
- Have a household Adjusted Gross Income at or below \$65,000 or a Student Aid Index of 3,000 or less
- File the FAFSA or CAFSA by June 1 the year you plan to enroll
- Apply for and authorize the College Opportunity Fund (COF)
- Enroll in 12+ credits
- Maintain satisfactory academic progress

We keep it simple — if you are admitted to the university and meet the criteria above, you will receive the UNC Tuition Promise! Thanks to a combination of federal, state, university and donor-based funding, all students who qualify will receive a combination of funds in their financial aid offer from UNC.
