CCRE Stipends Help Rural School Districts Attract Teachers

The <u>Colorado Center for Rural Education</u> and the <u>Colorado Department of Higher Education</u> work together to help alleviate the teacher shortage in rural Colorado school districts. To that end, we award <u>stipends</u> of up to \$6,000 to qualifying rural inservice educators who want to:

- Teach concurrent enrollment courses;
- Add an additional endorsement; or
- Fulfill a local faculty need.

The stipend offsets the cost to attend a qualifying program at one of Colorado's institutions of higher education. We asked three of the recipients to comment on how the stipend will help them achieve their academic and career goals.


Kevin Cronin teaches science and social studies at Aspen Middle School in Aspen School District 1. He said the award has given him the opportunity to further develop his science education career by attending graduate school at the University of Northern Colorado.

"It is hard work teaching and attending graduate school at the same time, but I love learning new things and applying them in my classroom. I can't thank the Colorado Center for Rural Education enough for opening this door for me. I wouldn't have been able to attend graduate school without the stipend.

We also award <u>stipends</u> to encourage teacher candidates to student teach in Colorado rural school districts and eventually become a teacher in a Colorado rural school district. The value of the stipend is up to \$4,000 for the semester of student teaching. Stipend recipients are expected to complete student teaching in a Colorado rural school district and then apply to and work in a rural school district.

Upcoming Application Timelines

National Board Certified Teacher Stipend applications for 2024 accepted: January 1, 2024, through June 15, 2024, or until 50 applications are received

Rural Inservice Educator Stipend applications for fall 2024 accepted: May 1, 2024, through August 31, 2024

<u>Colorado Rural Student Teaching Stipend</u> applications for spring 2025 accepted: July 1, 2024, through October 31, 2024

Colorado Substitute Stipend applications accepted: The program will end prior to the 2024-2025 school year. Applications accepted until funding has been expanded.
