HONORS PROGRAM STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

After completion of the University Honors Program, Honors students will have attained the following learning outcomes:

1. Problem Solving using Creative and Critical Thinking

Applies critical thinking to analyze, integrate, and evaluate information. Offers novel or innovative ways of solving problems. Demonstrates ability to see and speak about ambiguities and complexity of issues.

2. Inquiry Analysis through Integrative learning

Questions, connects and extends knowledge from one's own academic focus to the world beyond UNC. Integrates multiple disciplinary lenses when considering issues or developing creative endeavors. Originates lines of inquiry based on interdisciplinary or transdisciplinary exploration

3. Scholarly Communication

Can communicate one's thoughts on paper and in speech effectively with a scholarly voice by using evidentiary support and critical reasoning, within philosophical, analytical and theoretical frameworks appropriate to the discipline. Uses appropriate citation and attribution for the discipline and joins in the scholarly discourse.

4. Intercultural Awareness

HONORS PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The University Honors Program is designed to support students who:

- Take intellectual risks
- Ask challenging questions
- Make interesting connections
- Explore their world
- Create new ways of doing things

The Honors Program supports students on their intellectual and academic journey by providing avenues for additional student-directed study and generating environments where challenging conversations can develop with peers and faculty members. The Program asks that students engage in various pursuits of the mind and cultivate greater expectations for themselves and their education. It seeks to heighten critical awareness, involve students in independent thinking and research, and encourage leadership in the university and community.

UNC's Honors Program is **not** focused on extrinsic symbols of academic achievement, which can be misleading (e.g. Grades and Grade Point Averages; test scores). Instead, the program seeks to encourage and support students to take risks, and to learn that failures and mistakes are part of the learning process. The Honors Program encourages students to explore their strengths, in all the various forms and varieties, not just those most often rewarded through the traditional education system. The program recognizes that students are whole people, and therefore takes a holistic approach to what is meant by student excellence, asking students to engage in connecting ideas, thinking outside of the box, trying out different activities and different disciplinary approaches to learning. Multiple intelligence styles and strengths, including but not limited to the following, are all appreciated with the UNC Honors Community:

- Quantitative/Logical
- Qualitative/linguistic
- Physical/Athletic
- Musical
- Interpersonal/People skills
- Naturalistic
- Visual/Spatial
- Intrapersonal/Emotional intelligence

Students who graduate with University Honors Program distinction will complete a curriculum that consists of 16 credit hours and includes interdisciplinary seminars and experiential course work, such as internship, study abroad and research courses, along with a capstone project of the student's choosing. Students typically enroll in interdisciplinary discussion based Honors seminars in their first year, experiential coursework in year two or three, and complete their capstone project, which can be creative, applied or research based, in years three and/or four. Transfer students may begin their capstone while they are also completing their experiential or seminar based course work. Over 50% of the Honors Program interdisciplinary seminars also count towards Liberal Arts Core (LAC also known as general ed) requirements. Experiential course work often double counts toward a student's major requirements.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

Students are encouraged to apply for the Honors Program as incoming first year students when they apply for admission to UNC, immediately following the receipt of their acceptance from UNC. Students may apply and enter at any stage as a UNC undergraduate student through the start of their senior year, as long as they can still complete the credit hours before their expected graduation date. The application for admission to the program requests short written statements based on thoughtprovoking questions. The requirements for the Honors Program can be found at www.unco.edu/honors.

The Honors Program strives to provide talented students from all backgrounds with opportunities for original thought, student-directed learning, and individualized paths of inquiry. Therefore, all students who have a passion for learning and a desire to dive deeper into their studies are encouraged to apply even if their scores from high school standardized testing do not put them in the top percentiles. The Honors Program is about providing opportunities for those who want to get more out of their academic studies and who have the drive and passion to be successful. Any incoming first year, transfer student, or current UNC student may apply for the Honors Program.*

- * Entering freshmen with a high school GPA over 3.50 are automatically provided with the application through the UNC admissions portal. However, all incoming students can request an application link.
- * Students already enrolled at the University of Northern Colorado or those transferring from another college should have a minimum college GPA of 3.00, but may apply with a lower GPA, and are asked to provide additional information to ensure that they can take on the additional course work (capstone) for Honors.

BENEFITS

Unity in Diversity

Honors students come from a variety of backgrounds and have diverse academic and social interests. Together, they form a community of highly motivated learners from across campus.

Honors Events and Activities

Students and faculty are invited to participate in a variety of regular events including New Student Retreat, Coffee with the Profs, Honors Colloquium Series, Honors Workshops, TEDish Talks, Student Showcase of Artists and Scholars, Honors Research Night and many other events.

Personalized Advising

All Honors students enjoy personalized advising from university faculty and Honors staff.

Faculty Mentoring

Honors students can meet honors faculty mentors in outside of the classroom activities, and all University Honors Program students complete a faculty-mentored honors capstone project.

Honors Residence

Students in the Honors Program have the option to live in either the West Campus or Central Campus Honors Residential Learning Community.

Honors Conferences

Honors students have opportunities to attend and present at regional and national conferences such as National Conference of Undergraduate Research and the National Collegiate Honors Conference.

Honors Publications

Honors theses are placed in the permanent collection in Michener Library and students have the opportunity to submit their finished research articles for publication in research journals.

Local and National Leadership Opportunities

Students can participate in Student Honors Activities Council, leading campus Honors community activities. The UNC Honors Program is also part of the larger National Collegiate Honors Council, and students have the opportunity to become regional or national officers, serve on committees, and participate in national programs such as *Partners in the Parks*.

Recognition

On their diplomas and transcripts, Honors students are recognized as "University Honors" or "Honors Capstone" graduates. At commencement, Honors students wear a gold stole in recognition of their achievement.

Priority Registration

University Honors Program students receive priority registration status after they have completed first-year honors experience, if they are active in the co-curricular elements of the program and making adequate progress toward Honors Program Completion. Transfer students and continueing UNC students who join Honors Program after their first year, receive priority registration after they have been in the Program at least one year and are making adequate progress toward Honors Program completion including meeting the minimum requirements through Honors Connect.

HONORS GATHERING PLACES

U-Engage Lounge Spaces and Honors & McNair Scholars Offices Michener L-98, Lower Level

The Honors Program makes its home in the northwest corner on the garden level of the Michener Library. In this location, you will also find the offices for the McNair Scholars Program, the Office of Undergraduate Research, Leadership Studies minor, National Scholarship and Fellowship support, and the Schulze Endowment.

Two student lounges provide an opportunity to rest, study, and store personal items between classes. The kitchen in the larger "U-Engage Lounge" is available to all Honors students, and especially helpful for commuting students, for storing refrigerated items, heating up food, or making a hot drink. Key card access can be granted upon request for after hours access. A smaller "Einstein" Lounge is the quiet space for studying or quiet meetings.

The U-Engage Lounge is available to reserve for related Honors Program activities such as workshops. The collection of Honors Theses is contained on the bookshelves within the U-Engage Lounge and are available for students to peruse while in the Lounge. A bulletin board outside the

offices provides a location for posting Honors activities while resources for various opportunities are found inside the office. Computers are available for Student Honors Council work.

Honors Residential Learning Communities Central Campus - Lujan Hall

Lujan Hall hosts the Honors Residential Learning Community and includes a community kitchen and lounge space in Lower Centennial for Honors programming.

West Campus – North Hall

The Honors Program also hosts a residential community for Honors Program students on West Campus in North Hall, fifth floor. North Hall is also home to the Center for Applied Contemplative Studies (CFACS), where many mindfulness based programs and activities take place, and is often open for Honors Student participation.

HONORS CURRICULUM & PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

Honors Program Overview

The Honors Program offers several entry points for students with a desire to broaden or deepen their academic studies.

First Year Honors Experience is designed for incoming first year/first time students who want an introduction to Honors education. The program curriculum is interdisciplinary and supports students to produce honors quality scholarship. Students completing the Honors First Year Experience receive the designation "First Year Honors" on their UNC transcript.

University Honors is designed for students who want to take full advantage of the intellectual breadth and depth of the Honors Program, providing access to upperdivision electives and in-depth research experiences culminating in the creation of a Senior Honors Capstone project. Students who completed First Year Honors simply continue their journey, but all UNC students -- including transfer students -- may apply for entry to the program as late as the end of their sophomore year. Students completing the University Honors Program receive recognition at commencement and official designation as "University Honors" on both their transcript and diploma.

Honors Capstone Experience program is designed for juniors and seniors who discover Honors too late to take advantage of the full program or who want to explore their major discipline in-depth through the creation of an Honors Capstone project. This project may be in the form of a traditional research thesis, a creative work, or an applied project. Students completing this capstone-only program receive "Honors Capstone" designation on their transcript.

First Year Honors Experience

Completion of all Honors First Year Experience requirements will earn a "First Year Honors" designation on the student's transcript, regardless of whether the student chooses to remain in the Honors Program.

To receive a "First Year Honors" Certificate, the Honors Program student will complete the following components:

General Requirements:

- Complete a total of 6 course credits in Honors introductory courses.
- Participate in at least one Honors Connect activity.
- Achieve a cumulative 3.00 UNC GPA.

University Honors Program

The University Honors curriculum provides students the opportunity to engage in both broad interdisciplinary study and in-depth exploration of a specific topic. It builds on the First Year Experience and culminates in an Honors Capstone project. University Honors Students may complete their Capstone Project within or outside their chosen major.

General Requirements:

- Complete a total of 12 credits of Honors coursework. At least 6 credits must be upper division. The Honors First Year Experience automatically satisfies 6 of these credits.
- Complete at least 4 credits of Honors Capstone requirements and an Honors Capstone project approved by the Honors Program and presented in a public forum.
- Participate in at least six Honors Connect activities.
- Achieve and maintain a minimum cumulative 3.00 UNC GPA.

Lower-Division Honors Courses: up to 6 credits

Note: Students who complete the First Year Experience will have already fulfilled 6 credits of Lower Division Honors Coursework and should choose Upper Division Courses from the list below.

Students who did not participate in the First Year Experience *may* choose up to 6 credits from the following list, though they may also choose courses from the Upper-Division Honors Course list below to satisfy the Honors Coursework requirement.

Honors Capstone

The Honors Capstone curriculum provides upper-division students the opportunity to engage in indepth study of a topic either within or outside of their major degree program and culminates in an Honors Capstone Project. Projects may include:

- a senior thesis based on field research, experimentation, or library or archival research;
- an applied or civically engaged business, non-profit, or curriculum design and delivery project; or
- a creative work in humanities or the arts.

All projects require a written component with critical, research-based, reflective analysis, and all students present their project in a public forum to educate others on their topic. Completed projects are bound and placed in the permanent collection of the James A. Michener Library, and Honors students are also encouraged to submit their final written project for inclusion in a scholarly journal, such as UNC's undergraduate research journal, URSIDAE. During their Honors Capstone experience students work individually with a faculty mentor to strengthen their research, writing, creativity, and presentation skills.

General Requirements:

- Completion of Honors Capstone course requirements (4 credits).
- Completion of Honors Capstone project approved by the Honors Program and presented in a public forum.
- Participation in at least two Honors Connect activities.
- Achieve and maintain a minimum cumulative 3.00 UNC GPA.

Every final Honors Capstone project must be approved by the Honors Program and presented in a public forum to fulfill the capstone requirement. Students who choose a departmental capstone course should consult regularly with the Honors program to ensure they are on track to meet this requirement.

Students who complete the Honors Capstone Project without participating in the full University Honors experience will receive an "Honors Capstone" designation on their transcript.

HONORS SEMINARS

Honors Interdisciplinary Courses

Students may take up to three (3) interdisciplinary courses designated by Honors as courses to meet requirements. These courses engage students in topics that often cross disciplinary boundaries, explore subjects more deeply, and examine the many diverse ways of knowing. These courses change each semester and usually count toward Liberal Arts Core Requirements. Contact the office about the upcoming Honors approved courses!

Honors Seminars

Students may take up to two (2) Honors Seminars. The seminars allow students to learn about a topic in-depth from several perspectives. HON 100 courses emphasize the connections between self and community in an interdisciplinary format and HON 200 courses engage students in an analysis of values and ethics in the context of the times. HON 395 are special topics and are generally highly engaged or interesting special issue-based courses.

HON 100 Honors Connections Seminar I

A variable content seminar emphasizing the connections between areas of knowledge such as the Sciences, Arts, Philosophy, History, Literature, and Sociology. Credits: 3

HON 101 Honors Introduction to Critical Thinking

An introductory course for Honors students emphasizing critical and creative thinking, perspective taking, inquiry, and inter-cultural competencies through in-depth discussions on contemporary issues, engaged learning opportunities, and community-based projects. Credits: 1

HON 180 Great Ideas in Context

An introduction to global, intellectual, and cultural traditions through reading and discussion of classic works of literature. Credits: 3

HON 182 Confluence of Cultures

An exploration of African American, Asian American, Hispanic American, Native American or U.S. immigrant cultures from historical, literary, and artistic perspectives. Credits: 3

HON 185 Religions and Worldviews

Explores major religious and non-religious worldviews by examining the history, literature, rituals, and teachings of a selection of religious traditions and worldviews, as well as influential ancient and modern critiques of religion. We will also consider the ways in which people construct worldviews, as well as the possibilities for inter-religious dialogue. Credits: 3

HON 200 Honors Connections Seminar II

A variable content seminar that will engage students in a concentrated analysis of values and ethics in the context of the times. Credits: 3

HON 351 Junior Honors Seminar

A seminar or tutorial required of juniors in Honors. Provides enrichment work in the student's discipline of choice and a start on the senior Honors research thesis. Credits: 1-3

HON 395 Honors Special Topics

An advanced study of selected topics of an interdisciplinary nature for Honors Program students. Repeatable under different subtitles with no limits on the number of times it can be repeated. Credits: 3

HON 420 Honors Research Methods

Examination of research paradigms and methodologies to develop the most appropriate research methods and data analysis processes to design and develop a successful Honors thesis proposal. Credits: 3

HON 451 Senior Honors Research Thesis

Different sections are offered by different departments. Required for senior participants in the Honors Program. Course is repeatable with a maximum of 3 credit hours. Credits: 1-3

HON 492 Honors Internship/Study Abroad

This course offers variable credit in an approved study abroad and/or internship for the Honors Program. S/U graded. Course is repeatable with a maximum of 6 credit hours. Credits: 1-4

HONORS EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING OPTIONS

Study Abroad or Internship options for upper division honors credit.

Students may pursue a Study Abroad, internship, practicum, student teaching or other practical based course work to count toward the upper division honors credits. There is no length requirement for a study abroad option. Allowable options may range from one-week faculty-led courses (often offered in summer or winter interim session) to a full year abroad and anything in between.

All of the following courses are pre-approved to count toward an Honors Students University Honors Program upper division credit hours.

HONORS CONNECT - COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Being an Honors Student is about more than just academic course work. It is also important that Honors Students become active members of their program as a way to broaden their experience base and develop problem solving and critical thinking skills. Honors Connect is required to be eligible for any Honors scholarships and to receive priority registration status.

Students should participate in a mix of activities to stay engaged with their Honors community. Points will be earned based on activity type and activity options and points will be communicated to all students through the Honors email newsletter. Alternative activities can be considered on a caseby-case basis for students whose schedules do not allow regular attendance at the designated activities, including students with outside work or family commitments and commuter students. Students may log alternate activities and will be notified if those activities do not meet the minimum threshold to be considered community engagement.

Requirements For Graduation and Program Completion:

- First Year Experience Students must participate in at least 1 activity in their first year to receive the First Year Experience completion.
- University Honors Program Students must participate in 6 Honors connect activities (not points, but actual separate activities, which may equal more than 6 points) to graduate with Honors distinction and to receive regalia, The requirement may be completed at any time.
- Honors Capstone Experience Students must participate in at least 1 activity to receive the Capstone Experience completion on their Transcript.

Requirements For Priority Registration Status

Students who earn a minimum of 10 Honors Connect points during the past semester are eligible to be on the list for priority registration for registration of classes during the following semester, as long as they continue to be eligible for priority registration based on all other requirements through their registration date and are making adequate progress through the curriculum toward Honors Program completion. Adequate progress through Honors Program curriculum is determined by having a plan filed with the Honors Program that is shared with the major advisor, included in the student's Plan of Study/Degree Worksheet in Degree Works, as well as the student being on track as stated in the plan. All decisions regarding on track status are determined by the Honors Undergraduate Academic Engagement Executive Director.

Honors Connect Benchmarks and High Points

Students will earn rewards for reaching certain points benchmarks, and at the end of each semester, the high point earners are recognized.

Standard Point Allocations

Workshops – 2-3 points each

Examples include:

- Grad School: What is it, do I need it, and how would I pay for it?
- How to Win with Your Presentation
- Best Kept Secrets of College

- Scholarships and Fellowships 101
- Resume writing for Honors Students

Academic Speaker and Honors Colloquium Events – 2-4 points

Examples include:

- Disturbing the Peace Colloquium will include a film screening, talk by one of the participants in the documentary, and round table discussions led by Anthropology students from Culture & Conflict. (November 9, 2024). 4 points
- Faculty Colloquium Presentations by professors regarding an area of their current research, such as "Costume and Identity" by Dr. Tom Endres.

Honors Community Events – 1-2 points each

Examples include:

Campus and Community Events – 1 point each (Max 5 points)

- Leadership activities such as being an officer in a campus organization or participating in student government.
- Performing and Visual Arts sponsored events (performing or as spectator)
- Unite Workshops
- Other extra-curricular activities including activities and events hosted by Stryker Institute for Leadership, McNair Scholars, Reisher Scholars, President's Leadership Program, RHA or similar.
- Participating in local or regional or national performing arts groups or productions.

Honors Leadership roles- 1 point each

Examples include:

- Attending a SHAC meeting.
- Participating on a panel or as an Information Table volunteer at a UNC recruitment event.
- Ambassador activities

Undergraduate Research and Creative Endeavors – 1-4 points (may vary by activity)

- Attendance at conferences
- Research or creative project presentations
- Research project work
- Creative project work.

Verification of Participation:

Attendance will be collected at all events, and your current point status will be available by contacting honors@unco.edu. If you are using an alternative event for credit, it must be approved by the Graduate Coordinator for Communications, Planning & Advising, log it using the Honors Connect Event submission form, available through Honors Student Canvas.

Students will be awarded their benchmark gifts mid-semester and the end of the semester and must come to the Honors Program Lounge to pick up any prizes before the end of the next month.

* First year honors and capstone honors students must complete at least one event that is hosted by the Honors Program or SHAC to complete the program and have the program listed on their transcript. University Honors Program students must complete a minimum of six events during their full time in the Honors Program, which can be at any point in time.

RESOURCES FOR STAYING ON TRACK

Honors Advising

Honors Program Staff, including the Graduate Assistant for Communication, Planning and Advising, provide advising each semester to all Honors Students. Honors Advising is mandatory for first-year Honors students but may be completed in various ways to be convenient for the student. Students will attend one individual advising session each semester. Group advising sessions and drop-in advising may also be offered depending on the semester.

Honors Program Newsletter

Regular news and updates from the Honors Program and the Student Honors Council are sent through the Honors newsletter every week. This is the best way for students to obtain current information on all Honors Program news, funding opportunities, Student Honors Council events, and other items of interest to UNC's Honors community. All new Honors Students are automatically subscribed to this newsletter. If you are not receiving e-mails from the Honors newsletter (there is normally at least one per week during the academic year), then please send an e-mail to honors@unco.edu to ask to be subscribed.

Honors Program Planning/Progress Worksheet

The Honors Program office monitors student progress toward meeting course and program requirements and provides Planning Worksheets/Progress Reports to assist students with understanding the courses they must take and to document their current status in meeting all Honorsrelated requirements. In between Honors advising meetings, use the Program Planning Worksheet to track your own progress and plan your future honors coursework.

SCHOLARSHIPS & CONFERENCE OPPORTUNITIES

Students may apply for most of the Honors Program scholarships through UNC's Scholarship Application available through the student's URSA account, and most, but not all, also require student to have submitted a FAFSA application. A few scholarships are applied via specific academic work, such as the Honors Capstone, and do not require the UNC Scholarship Application.

Honors Program Scholarships

The Honors Program recognizes outstanding student scholarship with several Honors Program scholarships each year as well as through the following "named" scholarships, provided by generous donors and alumni of the program. For most scholarships, the student MUST complete the FAFSA and the Universal Scholarship Application in order to be considered for the award.

Becky R. Edgerton Memorial Award

This award, with a \$500 stipend, is given annually to the graduating senior who has completed a meritorious Honors thesis and who has demonstrated the greatest breadth of intellectual curiosity among Honors peers.

Paul Heidger Scholarship

The scholarship is awarded to an exceptional freshmen Honors student during their first year in the Honors Program. Preference is given to a student who is studying or planning to study the sciences.

Barbara Heidger Memorial Scholarship

The scholarship is awarded to an exceptional freshmen Honors student during their first year in the Honors Program. Preference is given to a student who has previously been involved with or has expressed an interest in International Studies.

Gregory E. and Debra K. Holman Scholarship

This scholarship is awarded to a first-generation Honors Program or PLP student who has attended UNC for at least two semesters as a full-time student who is not already receiving an Honors or PLPaffiliated scholarship. The student must demonstrate evidence of civic or community engagement, with preference given to students involved in environmental advocacy, environmental education, or cultural resource preservation.

Eugene D. & Peggy J. Koplitz Scholarship Award

Each year a \$1,000 award is given to an Upper Division Honors Program senior who produced the best proposal for their Honors Thesis project. To be eligible the student must have submitted an Honors thesis proposal to the Honors Program by the applicable Spring semester deadline, with approval as required by the handbook from the thesis advisor(s).

Marie Livingston Scholarship

High academic achievement, evidence of civic engagement in local, state, national, or international communities, professional organizations or student clubs, and satisfactory progression through the Honors curriculum are some of the criteria considered for the Marie Livingston Scholarship. Preference is given to Economics or International Studies majors. The scholarship is awarded to current Honors students who have completed at least two semesters of continuous, full-time enrollment in the UNC Honors Program prior to the year of award.

Phelps Family C.A.P. Awards

Championed by UNC friends Bob and Bonnie Phelps Family, the CAP Awards recognize students whose lives demonstrate an exceptional and exemplary personal commitment to:

- Contribute... by volunteering time and personal skills, talents, abilities, experience and passion around issues in service to the community.
- Achieve... by displaying a bias toward action and performance, overcoming obstacles and setbacks, and accomplishing goals.
- Pay-it-forward... by impacting the lives of others in meaningful and positive ways through random and planned acts of kindness, caring, and "giving back."

The Phelps Family CAP Awards are awarded to upper division undergraduate students, with junior or senior academic standing. Students do not need to be a member of the Honors Program.

Undergraduate Research Summer Stipends and Research Grants

When funding is available, a limited number of research grants are available for use on thesis-related research. Currently all research grants are administered through the Office of Undergraduate Research. National Scholarship Opportunities

A number of national organizations look favorably on Honors student applicants for their scholarship and fellowship programs. Many of the programs are highly competitive so students should plan to give appropriate time to crafting well prepared applications supported by strong letters of recommendation and other required documents if they apply to one or more of these programs. UNC Honors Program Students have applied for and been awarded or finalists in the following scholarship programs: Marshall, Rhodes (Finalist), Rotary International, Truman (Finalist), and others.

Conferences

Honors students have the chance to attend annual conferences at which they present their research and learn about the work that other university students are engaged in. Funding may be available to assist with travel expenses. Please contact the Honors office for additional information.

NCUR (National Conference on Undergraduate Research)

Honors students may compete annually to attend NCUR. The conference is held each year for students from all colleges and universities across the nation to present their research to a national audience. Students must first submit their research abstract to the Fall Undergraduate Research symposium to be eligible for consideration to represent UNC at NCUR. Seniors completing their Honors projects who are engaged in research are encouraged to apply.

NCHC (National Collegiate Honors Council) Conference

The annual NCHC Conference is attended by Honors program members from across the nation. The national conference occurs each year in a different metropolitan city. Honors students from UNC may attend the conference to present their Honors Research and to learn more about other Honors programs and national Honors opportunities. For more information, contact the Honors Program staff.

Student Showcase of Artists and Scholars (formerly called Research Day)

Student Showcase of Artists and Scholars provides all undergraduate and graduate students an opportunity to present their scholarly projects and creative endeavors to a campus-wide audience. All Honors Students should plan to attend Student Showcase to support Honors Students who are presenting their Honors Capstone projects.

STUDENT HONORS ACTIVITIES COUNCIL

The Student Honors Activities Council (SHAC) is an active student organization with multiple leadership opportunities for Honors Students to develop professional skills. The mission of SHAC is to provide Honors students with a wide variety of social and community activities to supplement their academic careers.

SHAC Activities and Events

Honors New Student Retreat

This annual event is held at the beginning of the fall semester. The retreat gives the Student Honors Council officers the opportunity to welcome new students to the Honors Program and to let them know about ways of getting involved in the Honors community as well as providing information about the Honors curriculum.

Community Service and Civically Engaged Projects

Honors students volunteer on a variety of projects that range in scope from tutoring school children to collaborating with local non-profit organizations. Group service projects are coordinated annually by Student Honors Council for Honors students to become more involved with their community while getting to know other Honors Students.

Social events

SHAC organizes a variety of fun events such as cosmic skating, ice cream socials, Bob Ross painting nights, day hikes, and frisbee golf tournaments. All activities give you points for Honors Connect!

How to Get Involved in SHAC

SHAC encourages all Honors students, whether in First Year Honors, the University Honors Program or Honors Capstone to become involved in Council activities. Information on upcoming events and activities is promoted through the Honors newsletter and/or through Facebook and Instagram. Students may also contact their SHAC officers if they would like to assist with an event, have a community service idea, or wish to be more involved in SHAC activities in general.

SHAC Officers

President: The SHAC president assists the other officers and ensures the Council functions smoothly, completes the paperwork or online requirements for SHAC to be a UNC registered student organization, such as chartering paperwork, sets meetings, organizes the SHAC Retreat and assists the Director for Honors with the New Student Retreat planning. The president also assists with recruitment and retention of Honors students. The President or their designee serves as the liaison between the student Honors Program membership and the Honors Executive Staff and Faculty Advisory Councils.

Vice President: The Vice President works closely with the president and the Honors office staff to best serve the Council, aids the group in their endeavors, provides support when needed, and fills in for the President as chair of meetings when the President is not available.

Treasurer: The Treasurer leads the Fundraising Committee, is responsible for keeping the financial records of the Student Honors Activities Council honestly and accurately, informs other members of the Student Honors Activities Council of the financial status of the organization, makes payments and accepts receipts as directed by the President and other members of the Council, and assists the President with preparing the annual budget

Secretary: The Secretary takes minutes during meetings, emails minutes to the Council, uploads minutes to the SHAC share drive, and helps maintain organization for the council as a whole.

Event Planning Committee Lead: The Leader must be someone who has been on the council for at least one year or a transfer student with experience in event planning. The Leader reports details of event planning to the executive committee, delegates tasks within the committee, leads meetings for the committee, and create meeting agendas.

Marketing/Social Media Specialist: The Marketing/Social Media Specialist is in charge of creating marketing materials for events put on by the council. They promote events on the UNCO Honors Facebook Page and other social media, are responsible for taking photos/videos at each event and for submitting event highlights to the Honors Program office staff for inclusion in the Honors newsletters.

Event Planning Committee Members: 1-3 committee members aid in the planning for each event.

Fundraising Committee Members: There will be 1-3 committee members who aid in the planning of fundraising events, led by the Treasurer.

SHAC Annual Elections

The Student Honors Activities Council holds an annual application process to select officers. All Honors students are encouraged to attend an annual informational meeting and to run for office. Traditional officer positions, as noted above, may be altered, added, or removed as the needs of the Honors community change. Offices may also be held jointly.

THE BECKY R. EDGERTON MEMORIAL HONORS SCHOLARSHIP

for Honors Students at the University of Northern Colorado

Becky Richards Edgerton (April 22, 1942-December 17, 1999) loved poetry, opera, and good movies; The New York Times Book Review and The New Yorker magazine; good literature, wine and conversation; feminist theory, loyal friends, and her family. For her, reading was a way of life, and she read just about everything. She published poetry, taught in the Honors and Life of the Mind programs, and directed the UNC Cluster Program from its inception. She wrote her doctoral dissertation on "Bright Glass: The Fictional World of Mary Webb," and later became a recognized scholar on the poems of Jane Kenyon. Her favorite places in the world were New York City, Paris, the tiny town of Russellville, Indiana where she grew up with her sister Bronna, and the sunny family room of her house in Greeley, its coffee table stacked high with books, and a cup of tea within easy reach. She was the warm and loving mother of two children, Kate and Jeremy, and the endlessly fascinating marriage partner of her husband, Ron.

Becky once asked herself: "What have I learned, then?" And she answered:

That I do have inner resources.

That tragedy is part of life.

That love can cause destruction.

That much can be salvaged.

That one can give only so much of oneself without permanent loss.

That children too become both more and less of me.

That relationships are central.

That there is a God.

That one learns to feel more from both love and loss.

That work is a saving grace.

That there is grace, and that it is unexplained.

That the way you meet a trouble is important.

That it is necessary to forgive and to know when to forgive.

That loyal friends count.

That the failure to create is a felt failure.

That taking risks can cause great pain.

That wild birds can bring pleasure.

That music can bring pleasure.

That these things can help save one.

That one can sleep through periods of one's life.

That poetry is part of life.

That religion is part of life.

That literature and religion are parts of the whole and part of each other.
