Each of these programs have two application cycles, and support archival projects, editing projects, educational programs, fellowships, publication grants, and projects dealing with electronic records, including digitization. All projects must help to identify, preserve, publish, and increase public access to non-federal sources that document the history of the United States. Competitions include:

Major Collaborative Archival Initiatives For collaborative projects that will significantly improve public discovery and use of major historical records collections.

For projects to plan and develop a working collaborative designed to enhance the capacity of small and diverse organizations with historical records collections.

State Board Programming Grants For projects that strengthen the nation's archival network through activities undertaken by state historical records advisory boards.

Publishing Historical Records in Collaborative Digital Editions For projects to publish documentary editions of historical records.

NEA Research Grants in the Arts

Synopsis Research Grants in the Arts support research studies that investigate the value and/or impact of the arts, either as individual components of the U.S. arts ecology or as they interact with each other and/or with other domains of American life. The NEA welcomes research proposals that address priority topics and possible questions as outlined in the agency's FY 2022-2026 research agenda.

The four research areas are: • The art's impact on health, education, and the economy The art's role in community transformation and healing Diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility in the arts The evolving ecosystem of the arts in the U.S.

Proposals to the Research Grants in the Arts program should align with at least one of the aforementioned topics, and, if possible, address research questions identical or similar to the related sample questions in the NEA's research agenda for FY 2022-2026.

Russel Sage Foundation Core Research Grants

Letter of Inquiry Deadline: April 16, 2024

Russel Sage Foundation (RSF) will accept letters of inquiry (LOIs) under all of its core programs and special initiatives: Behavioral Science and Decision Making in Context; <u>Future of Work Immigration and Immigrant Integration; Race, Ethnicity and Immigration;</u> Social, Political, and Economic Inequality. It will also accept LOIs relevant to its core programs that address the effects of: (a) social movements, such as drives for unionization and mass social protests, and the effects of racial/ethnic/gender bias and discrimination on a range of outcomes related to social and living conditions in the U.S.; and (b) the 2023 Supreme Court decision on race-conscious affirmative action and the relative merits of different models to promote diversity and the educational attainment and economic mobility of underrepresented and lower-income students.

After peer review, about 15% of those who submit an LOI will receive an invitation to submit a proposal. It is strongly recommend that you review the grant writing guidelines on the RSF website and also view an instructional webinar. Successful proposals from this round can have a start date on or after January 1, 2025.

This program supports projects that develop and implement educational programs for professionals who preserve and provide access to humanities collections. Such materials include but are not limited to paper-based, photographic, archaeological, ethnographic, artistic, audiovisual, digitized, and born-digital collections. NEH makes awards in this program to organizations that offer national, regional, or statewide education and training programs across the pedagogical landscape for current or emerging professionals. NEH Preservation and Access: Research and Development Grants

Application Available: February 21, 2024 - Application Deadline: May 21, 2024

The Research and Development program supports projects that address major challenges in preserving or providing access to humanities collections and resources. These challenges include the need to find better ways to preserve materials of critical importance to the nation's cultural heritage—from fragile artifacts and manuscripts to analog recordings and digital assets subject to technological obsolescence—and to develop advanced modes of organizing, searching, discovering, and using such materials.

This program supports projects at all stages of development, from early planning and standalone studies to advanced implementation. Research and Development projects contribute to the evolving and expanding body of knowledge for heritage practitioners, and for that reason, outcomes may take many forms. Projects may produce any combination of laboratory datasets, guidelines for standards, open access software tools, workflow and equipment specifications, widely used metadata schema, or other products.

Research and Development supports work on the entire range of humanities collection types including, but not limited to, moving image and sound recordings, archaeological artifacts, born digital and time-based media, rare books and manuscripts, archival records, material culture, and art. Applicants must demonstrate how advances in preservation and access through a Research and Development project would benefit the cultural heritage community by supporting humanities research, teaching, or public programming. Bicentennial Swedish-American Exchange Fund

Application Deadline: May 30, 2024

Synopsis

The Bicentennial Swedish-American Exchange Fund awards travel grants for proposed study visits for two to four weeks. The travel grant's purpose is to support opinion-forming projects within areas such as politics, public administration, unions, organizations, mass media, industry and commerce, K-12 education, and culture. Awards provide up to \$3,500 each. The program is specifically intended for professional enrichment and not applicable to work related to academic degrees, programs, or conferences.

Applicants must supply a realistic and comprehensive project description, which indicates follow-up plans as well as a plan for disseminating research results. U.S. applicants who have made recurrent visits to or resided in Sweden, and Swedish applicants who have made recurrent visits to or resided in the United States, will be considered only in exceptional cases. The grant may not be used to finance participation in conferences or ongoing academic research projects, or vocational or academic courses. The grant is intended for professional enrichment and is thus not applicable to studies or work related to academic degrees.

NEH Public Humanities Projects

Applications Available: May 14, 2024; Application Deadline: August 14, 2024

Synopsis

The Public Humanities Projects program supports projects that bring the ideas of the humanities to life for general audiences through public programming. Projects must engage humanities scholarship to analyze significant themes in disciplines such as history, literature, ethics, and art history. Awards support projects that are intended to reach broad and diverse public audiences in non-classroom settings in the United States. Projects should engage with ideas that are accessible to the general public and employ appealing interpretive formats.

Public Humanities Projects supports projects in three categories: Exhibitions, Historic Places, and Humanities Discussions, and at two funding levels: Planning and Implementation. Proposed projects may include complementary components: for example, a museum exhibition might be accompanied by a website or mobile app.

Project topics may be international, national, regional, or local in focus, but locally focused projects should address topics that are of regional or national relevance by drawing connections to broad themes or historical questions.

NSF Dear Colleague Letter: Assessing Societal and Economic Impacts of Place-Based Innovation

Concept Outlines Due: February 12, 2024

Synopsis
The NSF TIP Directorate is seeking concept outlines for its EArly-concept Grants for Exploratory Research (EAGER) program, which will fund collaborative, trans-disciplinary projects that advance the state of the art in assessing the societal and economic impacts of place-based innovation.

Subsequent EAGER awards will advance research that address gaps in publicly available data and associated knowledge to adequately and appropriately benchmark activities in place-based innovation grounded in integrating research and development (R&D), translation, and workforce development (WFD), with emphases on how we leverage the full spectrum of diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility (DEIA), as well as leveraging of cross-sector partnerships.

This DCL invites transdisciplinary teams to develop <u>convergent</u> and potentially <u>transformative</u> research proposals to address these gaps, and thereby increase the understanding of, and data surrounding, the elements of a regional innovation ecosystem and the various ways in which they interact and intersect with one another.

NSF Civic Innovation Challenge (CIVIC) A Research and Action Competition Driven By
Community Priorities

Application Deadline: May 1, 2024

Synopsis

The Civic Innovation Challenge (CIVIC) is a research and action competition that accelerates the transition to practice of foundational research and emerging technologies into communities through civic-engaged research. By addressing priorities at the local scale that are relevant across the US, CIVIC is laying the foundation for a broader and more fluid exchange of research and technology capabilities and civic priorities through joint partnerships involving civic partners and the research community. CIVIC funds projects that pilot state-of-the-art solutions to community challenges over 12 months, following a sixmonth planning phase, and have the potential for lasting impact in the partnering

community, as well as the potential to be scaled and implemented in other communities.

Additionally, the foundation for CIVIC projects should be rooted in maturing and transitioning state-of-the-art research in disciplines, including but not limited to computer science, engineering, geosciences, biological sciences, and social sciences.

CIVIC is uniquely designed to enable transition to practice of innovations into communities, as follows: (1) CIVIC flips the community-university dynamic, by empowering communities and researchers to jointly identify civic priorities ripe for innovation and to address these priorities as equal partners; (2) CIVIC focuses on research-centered solutions that are ready for piloting in and with communities on a short timescale, where real-world outcomes can be evaluated within 12 months; (3) CIVIC requires a coalition of communities and civic partners and a multi-disciplinary set of researchers to co-create and execute pilot projects; and (4) CIVIC organizes and fosters nationwide "communities of practice" around high-need problem areas that allow for meaningful knowledge sharing and cross-site collaboration during both the pre-development and piloting stages.

academic and civic partners must be based in the United States or its protectorates. For purposes of clarity, civic partners may include local, state, or tribal government officials; nonprofit representatives; community organizers or advocates; community service providers; and/or others working to improve their communities.

For this solicitation, civic partnership and engagement activities, communities, and

CIVIC is organized as a two-stage competition with two tracks centered around the following topic areas:

- Track A. Climate and Environmental Instability Building Resilient Communities through Co-Design, Adaption, and Mitigation
- Track B. Bridging the gap between essential resources and services & community

In Stage 1, approximately 35-40 Planning Grant awards will be made – each with a budget of up to \$75,000 for six months to undertake planning and team development activities. These include solidifying the team, maturing the project plans, and preparing a welldeveloped full proposal for submission to Stage 2. Only Stage 1 CIVIC recipients can submit to the CIVIC Stage 2 competition.

In Stage 2, approximately 20 Full Awards will be made. These will be selected from Stage 1 award recipients. For Stage 2, proposals will be considered with budgets up to \$1,000,000 for up to 12 months. Proposals must describe how the PIs will execute and evaluate their research-centered pilot projects.

Throughout both stages, NSF award recipient (2223449) MetroLab Network (metrolabnetwork.org, nsfcivicinnovation.org) will foster "communities of practice" through in-person and virtual activities, aimed at enhancing the teams' capacity-building, networking,

The sustainability movement has reached the business models of nearly every industry in the US, and many companies, municipalities and states have set aggressive sustainability goals that include how waste streams are being managed. The EREF Board of Directors has set an initiative to ensure research funded reflects EREF's long-term strategic plan to address all areas of integrated solid waste management, with a strong focus towards research that increases sustainable solid waste management practices.

Previously awarded grants have ranged from \$15,000 to over \$500,000 with the average grant amount in recent years being \$160,000. Typical project durations are about 2 years.

Association for Women in Mathematics Travel Grants

Application Deadlines: May 15, 2024 & October 1, 2024

Synopsis The Association for Women in Mathematics has administered the NSF-AWM Travel Grant Program for Women since 1988, supporting both travel to domestic or foreign research conferences and, more recently, longer-term visits with a mentor.

Travel Grants. Enabling women mathematicians to attend conferences in their fields provides them a valuable opportunity to advance their research activities and their visibility in the research community. Having more women attend such meetings also increases the size of the pool from which speakers at subsequent meetings may be drawn and thus addresses the persistent problem of the absence of women speakers at some research conferences. The Mathematics Travel Grants provide full or partial support for travel and subsistence for a meeting or conference in the applicant's field of specialization.

Mentoring Travel Grants. The objective of the NSF-AWM Mathematics Mentoring Travel Grants is to help junior women to develop a long-term working and mentoring relationship with a senior mathematician. This relationship should help the junior mathematician to establish her research program and eventually receive tenure. Each grant funds travel, accommodations and other required expenses for an untenured woman mathematician to travel to an institute or a department to do research with a specified individual for one month. The applicant's and mentor's research must be in a field which is supported by the Division of Mathematical Sciences of the National Science Foundation.
